



First Fruits Farm is a 1,000-acre farm founded by former NFL player Jason Brown. Rooted in faith and service, the farm's mission is to fight hunger and promote health by growing and donating fresh, nutritious food to those in need. Since its inception, First Fruits Farm has provided more than 2 million pounds of produce to communities across North Carolina. Through sustainable farming practices, educational programs and community outreach, the farm feeds the hungry and fosters awareness of food insecurity and healthy living.

First Fruits Farm has been featured on the PBS show Growing a Greener World, NBC's Today and CBS's On the Road With Steve Hartman. Jason also published a book titled Centered: Trading Your Plans for a Life That Matters that tells the story of his journey from the NFL to a life of service.

In addition to their focus on fighting hunger, the Browns also manage 410 woodland acres as part of their larger agricultural operation. They have made significant road improvements, installed culvert pipes, conducted prescribed burns, thinnings and final harvests, replanted genetically improved trees, established a heritage apple orchard and planted hybrid American chestnuts. In 2023, the Browns were named N.C. Outstanding Tree Farmers of the Year.

The 2025 Annual Meeting will include a field tour focused on agritourism, pond management, bird and wildlife habitat, and sustained yield forest management. The awards ceremony will recognize Tree Farm anniversaries, the Inspector of the Year and the Outstanding Tree Farmer of the Year.
